



## Climate (of) Change: Working Towards Climate Justice and Green Jobs

It's the people who are least responsible for climate change, including Indigenous populations, people facing poverty, and those in the Global South, who are hardest hit by its impacts. These populations are the most in need of strategies to deal with impacts, but are also the least likely to be represented in global climate change negotiations. In contrast, Global North countries, which represent less than one-fifth of the world's population, are responsible for almost three-quarters of all greenhouse gas emissions.

Corporate-driven globalization and free market policies that promote unsustainable production, consumption and trade are all root causes of out-of-control climate change.

### Where's Canada? Stuck in the tar sands

- The tar sands are the fastest growing source of greenhouse gas emissions in Canada and an important reason why we haven't committed to a plan with effective hard caps on industrial emissions.
- Federal and many provincial governments are committed to becoming an "energy super power" which shackles us to an unsustainable export-oriented trade model at the expense of social and environmental priorities.
- Despite Canada's Kyoto pledge, our emissions are now 29 per cent above Canada's Kyoto target!



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## United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) Dec. 7-18

The goal of the 15th session of the UNFCC (referred to as COP15) is to decide the next steps after the Kyoto Protocol expires in 2012. Many see COP15 as a crucial moment in time for enacting climate action with a new global deal. Others are concerned that corporations will continue to have the ear of policy makers and warn that solutions based on the failed free trade, corporate-led globalization model will not produce the results our planet needs.

### Climate justice now!

The only solution to climate change is a just solution. We need immediate national and international plans to transition to a low carbon future. In Canada, this must include committing to science-based targets for emission reductions, improving energy conservation and efficiency, providing the rapid expansion of public transit and renewable power, and creating Just Transition programs for workers and impacted communities.

A new global deal must lead to real emission reductions, be fair and equitable, and place a greater burden of responsibility on the Global North.
